Step 3: Set up an account with Education Planner BC. This is where you will do most of your applications when you are ready https://www.educationplannerbc.ca/ (save password in phone!)

**Step 6:** Start collecting all that you need for your scholarship applications:

- At least one reference letter
- A personal essay expressing why you are awesome and deserving of money (May need to brush up on your writing skills)
- Some places require a resume make sure you have a good one with cover letter

**Step 7:** Book another appointment with Ms. Tetreau to help you narrow your options, sift through your thinking, help you through your application process, or proofread your essay.

Step 9: Celebrate your acceptance into the program of your choice and all the money you won on scholarships

**Step 5:** be aware of deadlines and begin to make some decisions about plans.

- Large Money Scholarships are due between Sept and January
- Local Scholarship package is ready in March (prior to Spring break)
- Band Funding deadline is May 30
  - Early Admissions deadlines are usually January
- Regular admissions deadlines vary but aim for April/May at very latest!

A few things to know:

- It is easier to do applications online but you will need a way to pay for the application fee (access to a Visa card?)
  - $\cdot$  Yes, there is an application fee for most colleges and universities

### One Special Christmas!

As we decorate the house to the sound of "Oh This is Christmas", we feel a deep sense of joy being a part of a happy family, coupled with a familiar sadness of not being able to share the season with family. Perhaps a time for us to reflect and cherish memories of Christmas's past. A time to look back at the long line of Christmas's that went before the people that we celebrated with, the shared JOY and feelings of Peace, Love and Happiness. As I look back with nostalgia at Christmas's past, I recall one special Christmas:

I would have been 11 years old. My mon, dad, older brother and sister, 16 and 12 and myself and younger brother, 10, had recently relocated from Vancouver Island to the Yukon Territory as my dad was offered a job working on the Alyeska Pipeline. It was to be a wonderful adventure, driving the gravel roads of the Alaska Highway. I remember singing away as we encountered flat tires, dust and mosquitoes! And, after what seemed like days on the road with us children voicing, "I'm hungry, I have to go to the bathroom" and the continual question "are we there yet?" we finally arrived at our destination. Dezadeash Lodge, a few hours southwest of Whitehorse, Yukon. We got busy right away setting up tents and making ready our camp. This became our home, during that summer, while building our first cabin, a 10 X 12 dwelling with loft, to winter in followed by a bigger cabin 24 X 24 the following year.

That first winter was bitter cold (-55 below at its coldest) with no electricity, no running water, and no generator. My dad built our wood store out of a 90-gallon drum to provide heat. White gas, coal oil and baggy mantel lamps were our source of light and dad built us an outhouse for our toilet. Our water source was from a lake nearby which due to the extreme cold winters, froze solid. My one recollection was of my dad going to fetch water saying to mom, "keep the children in the house" as he proceeded to set dynamite, that he procured in his travels, to open a waterhole in the lake. I can still see him lighting the fuse and legging it up to the house, where we were anxiously watching from the window. Now, picture an explosion of ice, water and fish flying everywhere. Looking back, I am sure we broke every Ministry arm of the government with that little endeavour but, we got water!

I remember our first Yukon Christmas as if it were yesterday. My parents, with a distressed look, sitting us down saying, "we are struggling to make ends meet so, there will be no Christmas this year." My siblings and I sat in silence, I am sure sharing the same thoughts, Christmas a purely joyful time of family, food, and the sharing of gifts, was not to be. Not without dismay, our thoughts were quickly interrupted with our mom continuing "however, if you were to get one present, I want you to write down what you would wish for". Without hesitation, I immediately envisioned a pair of chocolate striped bell bottom jeans that I had seen in Whitehorse at the Hougens Department Store.

Time passed and I never thought about the jeans again as, my thoughts immediately shifted to how my brothers, sister and I could find a way to turn the grim reality of 'no Christmas' to A Christmas to Remember! The four of us quickly put our minds together with a plan to approach our good neighbour and owner of the Dezadeash Lodge, Katie Eckervogt, to inquire if there was any work that we could do around the lodge to make enough money to buy our mom and dad a Christmas present. We had already chosen the two gifts, a beautiful jade broche, for our mother (years later, I remember thinking how ghastly looking that broche was, but ohlh sooo beautiful at the time) and a silver flip-up lighter, with an engraved dog sled team on it, for dad. Mrs. Eckervogt came through for us and to this day I remain profoundly grateful!

Christmas morning, my brothers, sister and I awoke early and although resigned to the fact that mom and dad had called off Christmas, we could not be more excited to lift their spirits by presenting them with their gifts. Mom immediately started crying and our first reaction was, she does not like her gift. Then when our dad became teary-eyed, we also thought that he did not like his gift. Then before we knew it, we were all crying. Mom and dad then began laughing and crying. Somewhat confused, we soon realized that their tears were tears of joy. I can safely say, at that moment, my siblings and Leould not have been happier. Christmas was saved! And...to our amazement and great surprise, mom and dad somehow were able to fulfil each of our wishes as well. I got the best present of all "the striped bell bottom jeans I had so admired in the Hougen's Department Store window."

When I reflect back on my childhood, I remember Christmas holidays as 'special' and some of my happiest and most comforting times. And although we never received a lot of presents, it was not about presents it was about spending time with mom and dad, time that they took away from their day for usly Yes, there were times of strife, debt, bickering, rushing around and a disorganized mess however, our traditions had a very loose foundation of togetherness, love, acceptance, sharing, and laughter. Given this and all these years later, I find myself grateful for the gift of family, friendship, and fond memories of the holiday season. May the warm memories of the holidays be with you and yours and all the very best as we embark on a New and exciting

















